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How you will make a difference:

The funds you raise will help us:

- Develop cures for blood cancer, now and in the future.
- Improve treatment and care for those living with blood cancer today.
- Prevent blood cancer from developing in the first place.

Fundraising in your community is a great way to reach people and raise important funds. Every penny helps!

- £150 could fund a researcher to analyse 120 blood cell samples, potentially leading to a breakthrough.
- £500 could fund a clinical trials nurse for three days, providing support when it's needed most.
- £1500 could fund a month's worth of experiments

How much time will you need to give?:

This role is completely flexible—give as much or as little time as you can. Typically, it may involve a few hours a month.
